

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Te Rēhita Mate Ūtaetae -Breast Cancer Foundation National Register

30,000 voices: Informing a better future for breast cancer in Aotearoa New Zealand

In February, colleagues from the Breast Cancer Foundation released this report providing detailed information about diagnosis, treatment and outcomes for patients with breast cancer over the past 20 years and how well New Zealand compares internationally. Information from 30,000 breast cancer patients from the Breast Cancer Foundation National Register was analysed.

The report shows the steady progress against breast cancer over the last two decades. We were amazed to see quite how much!

Survival for women with breast cancer in NZ has

improved significantly. The five-year risk of dying from breast cancer has halved and the 10-year risk of dying from breast cancer is down by 30%.

There were significant improvements in breast conservation rates (and reduced mastectomy rates) for women with newly diagnosed breast cancer particularly in the Waikato, where surgeons have been at the forefront of adopting new oncoplastic surgical techniques.

These improvements are due to a combination of better treatments, more screening coverage and finding cancers early, better breast awareness and access to health care services. Behind all of this are breast cancer clinical trials and the introduction of more effective treatments and care. Though there is a lot to celebrate, this report also highlights areas where more needs to be done.

BCRT staff run the Midlands/Waikato regional division of the Register. We are proud of the part we played in this important report - it is gratifying to see it out in the public. We are very proud of our partnership with the Breast Cancer Foundation. The establishment of a truly national Register over 2020-2021 and the first review is a mammoth achievement!

Breast Cancer & Lymphoedema Clinical Research Trial

Waikato researchers are now seeking participants with breast cancer related lymphoedema for a clinical trial investigating whether lymph node grafting produces a greater reduction in lymphoedema volume and improved quality of life, compared with standard treatment.

A new, surgical technique, called lymph node grafting, has been developed and tested in a pilot study in the Waikato. The pilot study demonstrated that lymph node grafting showed promise as a treatment for moderately

severe treatment-resistant lymphoedema. Local researchers need further evidence to standardise and develop the lymph node grafting technique.

Participants who agree to participate will be randomly assigned to either:

- The control group (standard care): Will receive standard lymphoedema therapy alone. This includes self-administered massage, therapeutic exercise, use of a compression sleeve and skin/nail care; OR
- The intervention group: Will underao lvmph node grafting well surgery as as standard lymphoedema therapy. Waikato Plastic Surgeon Mr Winston McEwan, who has developed the lymph node grafting technique, is heading this trial.

My hope for the future of breast cancer research is that it brings more knowledge to the various types of breast cancer. Different diagnosis and treatment techniques can be more effective for different types of breast cancer".

Waikato Treasure Chests: NOW RECRUITING!

The Waikato Treasure Chests are a breast cancer survicor dragon boat team. They aim to bolster their members to ensure they are able to compete in 2023 at regionals and nationals, and then to enter a full breast cancer survivor team to compete at International Breast Cancer Paddling Committee event at Karapiro.

The IBCPC Dragon Boat Festival is held every 3 to 4 years under the auspices of the International Breast Cancer Paddlers' Commission. The festival is an international non-competitive event for breast cancer paddler teams who participate in the sport of dragon boating. For the first time since the establishment of IBCPC in 2010, the festival will take place in the southern hemisphere in New Zealand.

Research has proven the benefits of physical exercise. The repetitive upper body action of paddling encourages well-being for breast cancer survivors, especially in avoiding lymphoedema complications.
